

Warrimoo Public School Homework Procedure

- Encourage them to keep a journal or blog about their hobbies and interests.

o Year 5:

- Read and discuss articles from age-appropriate magazines or newspapers.
- Support your child in completing a small project on a topic they are passionate about.
- Encourage participation in community events, discussing their experiences afterwards.

Year 6:

- Read novels or non-fiction books, encouraging critical thinking by discussing different perspectives.
- Help your child prepare for future studies by practicing organisational skills and time management through planning activities.
- Encourage involvement in extracurricular activities, reflecting on what they learn from those experiences.
