# Principal's Report

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

#### **Return to Face-To-Face Teaching**

We have now officially completed our first week back to face-to-face teaching. It has been so wonderful watching the students returning to school with such positive attitudes. The energy in the classrooms and the playgrounds is incredible. The message of maintaining distance and keeping hygiene habits up are still being actively reinforced across the school. As a school, we really do appreciate the magnificent support that the entire community has demonstrated throughout this difficult and challenging period of time.











#### **Drop Off & Pick Up Responsibilities**

We continue to request that all children are dropped off from the front gate of the school and picked up in the same location in the afternoon. This is a requirement of the Department of Education regarding social distancing. Once we move out of the current restriction, parents will be encouraged and invited back into the school to conduct drop off and pick up. Thank you for your understanding and consideration regarding this request.

#### Warrimoo Yarn-Up

On Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> June Warrimoo Public School had scheduled a Warrimoo Yarn-Up to be held at the school. Unfortunately, due to the current climate of social distancing we have been forced to cancel this gathering. As a school community we hope to hold the next Yarn-Up on Thursday 17<sup>th</sup> September in Week 9 of Term 3.

#### Changes to the opportunity class placement process for 2020 Year 4 students

The 2021 Year 5 opportunity class placement process was put on hold in April 2020 due to the COVID-19 situation.

We now have a revised and simplified timeline for the OC placement process to ensure that students and families can have certainty about their placement as soon as possible.

The changes include:

- A new date for online applications. Parents must apply between 9 June 2020 and 26 June 2020. Late applications cannot be accepted.
- A new test date Wednesday 16 September 2020.

To ensure fair and consistent assessment of students across New South Wales, students will be offered places based only on their test results this year – there will be no school assessment scores.

There will also be no opportunity for appeals given the tight timeframes.

#### 2021 School Enrolments








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#### Warrimoo Public School's 2020 National Sorry Day Artwork

Inspired by Lee Hampton's 'Lest We Forget' art piece, Warrimoo PS students were invited to participate in the meaningful journey of creating a hand crafted Native Hibiscus for our special collaborative National Sorry Day artwork.

The idea of any artwork that Lee Hampton creates is "to connect people, have them see the issues we all face but allow them to dissect it in a non-confrontational way, which allows for peaceful discussions and hopefully inspires people to make changes". (Lee Anthony Hampton)

Our National Sorry Day artwork was not only inspired by Lee's piece 'Lest We Forget' but was also created with a similar idea in mind – connecting people, allowing for peaceful, deep and meaningful discussions for everyone of all ages, and inspiring others to learn, grow and make proactive and positive changes. Just like Lee Hampton's work, our artwork has lots of symbolism embedded throughout.

The background of our artwork is the Aboriginal flag. This not only represents the First Australians, but recognises the 2020 NAIDOC theme: Always Was, Always Will Be.


The hands that make up the sun are layered. This layering represents our deep history and the many events that have taken place over the years to the present. The layers represent the Stolen Generation as well as the many voices that continue to grow, reach out and work together for shared future. The act of placing a hand on someone's shoulder shows compassion, warmth and understanding which is also represented by the hands that make up the sun.

National Sorry Day marks the beginning of National Reconciliation Week. In 2020, the National Reconciliation theme is 'In this Together' which is also represented in the many layers and circular linked hands – a circle is ongoing, never ending and always ready for a positive change.

Students created their own Native Hibiscus in a medium of their choice, because we all have a choice to make a difference. With each individual effort, we acknowledge the impact that each and every one of us can make that leads to a more positive future for all – because we are All in this Together. Each native hibiscus is important and symbolises resilience, survival and healing.

If you look closely, you can see a little bee that one of our Stage 2 students added innocently to our work. Bees work together for the entire colony, not just for personal gain. They spread pollen from flower to flower, just as we can spread kindness from one person to another. This little bee sealed perfectly the theme for this year's Reconciliation Week theme,

'In this Together'
